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
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Gathering to grow a healthy culture

Bradon French on being a school chaplain

Bradon started as Chaplain at Wesley College's Glen Waverley campus in 2021, joining Kaylea Fearn who has been chaplain at the Elsternwick campus for five years. Their ministry was recognised at the Presbytery meeting.

"I started with 50% excitement and 50% utter terror. Six weeks in, and that balance seems about right. Wesley is a vibrant community with a proud history, and to be campus chaplain (& RE teacher) is a privilege.

In my previous Synod work, I've long envied our UCA school chaplains – their daily presence in school communities, the opportunity to offer pastoral care and prophetic insight to students, teachers and their families, and their witness to an embodied faith. As I tentatively follow in their footsteps, I now know that's just the tip of the iceberg.

I'm constantly thankful for the opportunity, the daily surprises and the rich blessings being a School Chaplain provides. Even if I have to wear a tie."

Frankston Clean Up

Members at High Street Uniting Church, Frankston, joined in the Clean Up Australia Day clean up at the Frankston beach. Overall 18kg of rubbish was picked up at the Frankston beach that morning, and 8kg of recyclables.

Mount Eliza Action

Members of The Village Church Mount Eliza believe our faith calls us to care for the creation and its people, and action on climate change is needed now.

Recently they took part in the #SacredPeopleSacredEarth event to bring awareness and encourage governments, including our Australian Government, to take bold action when they meet at COP26 in Glasgow in November.



Climate Data Scarves from Hampton & Pakenham

In 2020 the Creation & Climate Justice arm of Common Grace launched an initiative to bring together knitters from across Australia to knit 101 scarves that follow the pattern of 101 years of climate data. In winter 2021, these scarves will be distributed to church and political leaders to inspire climate action.

The scarf pattern represents the average global temperature across 101 years. It was inspired by the Cambridge Federation of Women's Institute's 100 Years Climate Scarf and uses Mick Pope's temperature data from 1919 to 2019. Each temperature is given a different colour on a spectrum to show the shift from cool to warm, and a stripe knitted to correspond to each year.

Ann Simons, minister at Hampton Uniting Church, shared the article about knitting scarves for Climate Change and eleven ladies from Hampton and one from Pakenham took up the challenge. Most of these are over 80 and a couple are over 90! There were 14 scarves sent in March.

The resurrection in a tent

Anneke Oppewal reflects on Exodus 25-40 and John 2: 18-22

How have you been going with the resurrecting of Church after a year of lockdowns and COVID19 restrictions? Still a bit unsettled? Not quite there yet?

One of the stories the Bible tells about long lasting unsettledness is the story about the people traveling through the Sinai desert for 40 years on their way to the promised land after they've left a life of slavery building what probably were religious and cultural monuments in the land of Egypt.

On that journey they get to carry a tent sanctuary with them that they pull down and resurrect as they go. Detailed instructions for the construction and furnishings of that sanctuary can be found in the last 15 chapters of Exodus.

Those instructions are filled with references to the story of God's journeying with the people up till then. There is reference to the seven days of creation, to the story of Noah and the flood, to the story of Moses being called to leadership and the exodus from slavery in Egypt.

Writing as it were, the history of creation and salvation into the very fabric of the tent. Reminding people of God's faithfulness and commitment every time the tent is put up.

They also carry a treasure chest with guidelines for a good life with them, placed in the sanctuary every time they set up camp. The Spirit of God coming down and hovering over it wherever they go.

The great temple in Jerusalem, was built on the same template. It was destroyed by the Romans in 70 AD.

In John's gospel Jesus refers to himself as the temple of God. A new, mobile and movable sanctuary with reference to God's faithfulness and love written all over it. With the treasure of God's guidance and abiding presence right in the middle of it.

Easter tells the story of how that sanctuary is pulled down and then resurrected in three days. How God continues the journey with God's people, continues to be present in and through the Spirit, even in the most unsettling of times.

Returning after COVID to our, not so portable, sanctuaries may feel unsettling. Maybe we wonder what lies ahead for us. It's not the first time God's people have found themselves wondering. So far God has always provided. Let's have faith that as the journey continues that provision will continue to be part of what we will experience in our time of God's faithfulness.



A Tent Prayer for Easter

God make us into a tent where your word can live, where your guidance is treasured and the Spirit brings order out of chaos.

A place that moves and is moveable, the story of your faithfulness written all over it testifying to the abundance of your gifts of grace to us

Shaping Uniting Church history

The Uniting Church Historical Society will explore how ministers of the past shaped the future at their Zoom meeting, Sunday, 18 April 2021 at 2.00pm.

Rowland Ward will talk about Laurence Rentoul, also known as Fighting Larry, an early Presbyterian leader in Melbourne. Arriving from Ireland in Australia in 1879 as Minister at St Georges Church, St Kilda East, he publicly argued against Melbourne's liberal theology leader Rev Charles Strong. A colourful theologian with diverse views, he opposed the Boer War yet became Chaplain General of the AIF in WWI. He was a firm Protestant yet supported Home Rule for Ireland, and gave the St Patrick's Day address in 1901.

Joan Waters will launch her book, Chance and Changes, telling the story of her late husband Reynolds Waters. Beyond Brighton Beach and Balwyn North, Rev Reynolds Waters was a parish minister who travelled widely within Victoria, and led churches in the USA.


Welcoming Children

Paul Dau, minister at Springvale Uniting Church, recently graduated from University of Divinity with a graduate certificate in children and families ministry. He writes about what he found valuable in the course.

The course on Children and Families Ministry helped me to gain an informed understanding of what it means to be called a child of God.

I found Judith Gundry-Volf's five images of children helpful. She describes children as both recipients of the reign of God and models of entering the reign of God. She writes about humility, serving children and being great, welcoming children and welcoming lesus.

I believe that if we adhere to those images in our congregational lives and practices, we can reduce the marginalisation of children. I would love to see an active participation of children in worship in a more focused and tailored way. We have been doing that here at Springvale over the last two years with the introduction of special services aimed at children.




