Churches unite in action to house the homeless



The Uniting Church is signing up to support an ecumenical program as part of a winter shelter scheme for the homeless.

The program offers beds in church spaces to prescreened homeless 'guests'.

Murrumbeena Uniting Church is joining local churches for this dynamic initiative, affiliated to Stable One Winter Shelter, and is hoping volunteers will come forward.



All volunteers will be asked to undergo police and working with children checks. Training provided.

Rev Jay Robinson explains: "Murrumbeena UC is getting involved in the Glen Eira Winter Shelter, which will be running for 12 weeks, from 1st July - 23 September."

This is an ecumenical outreach program and the following churches have already agreed to be host churches in the city of Glen Eira: Ormond Anglican, St Agnes Anglican, St Clements Anglican, Holy Cross Catholic, Seventh Day Adventist Glen Huntly and Eastleigh Community Church. Compass Church will provide facilities (including a shower) in the

daytime. Whitehorse churches are also hosting guests during the winter.

Theses churches will take turns one night a week sheltering up to 10 homeless guests and providing dinner, breakfast and the option to make sandwiches for lunch. Rev Jay Robinson adds: "We are looking for people to come forward to volunteer to work with a church involved in the project.

The Spirit of Mission

The book of Acts is the narrative of Spirit-inspired apostles on journeys beyond their comfort zones. Followers become pioneers. The gospel is shared and becomes grounded in communities of varied culture and language. From its earliest days, the church is marked by its diversity. Luke speaks more of context than crusade, reflecting chapter 10 of his Gospel account, where those sent come as guests seeking hospitality.



In Port Phillip East Presbytery, we are seeking to foster this Spirit of Mission by encouraging visioning, dialogue and reflective practice in relation to mission, and mission-shaped discipleship. Perhaps these seem like code words, so let's break it down.



Regional possibilities

A week ago the Presbytery hosted a consultation across six churches in the outer south east to begin to explore whether a shared vision for ministry and mission is part of God's future in this rapidly growing area.

The aim is not to consolidate but to spread. It's early days, but people were remarkably open to where such a conversation might lead.

Mission Experiments

Had we known about COVID-19, we might not have started a Mission Pilot Project in 2020!

The two pilot churches, Glen Waverley and Cheltenham-Mentone, along with the Pilot team, found the experiment to be quite a challenge during extended lockdown.

Nevertheless there were significant learnings about mission which will be reported to the Presbytery in June.

The Pilot steering group is making plans to help churches experiment in mission based on these learnings. What's your experiment zone?

New communities of faith

Casey-Cardinia region has a population the size of Tasmania, and is projected to grow by 250,000 people in the next 20 years.

Synod eLM staff and a neighbouring presbytery about identifying people to be part of fostering diverse faith communities into the future.

Perhaps in homes, perhaps linked to playgroups or op shops or cafes.

Congregational Consultations

The Presbytery's new
Consultation
Team, convened by Cam
McAdam, will explore how to



engage in strategic congregations for the sake of mission.

This means not simply waiting for five yearly reviews, but identifying communities ready to take a step and helping them to do it.

One focus is on different ways to help churches engage more fully in local mission. Cont. on page 3

Intercultural ministry and mission


If there's one thing we don't see in the early church narratives, it's survival mode. In the mixed economy of church life, there will always be deep roots and new shoots.

Bonds of friendship grew with guests including Ibu Moniroh Rahim, the Acting Indonesian Consul General, Dr Mohamed Mohideen, the President of the Islamic Council of Victoria and a member of the Monash City Council Multicultural Advisory Committee, and Mr. Teguh Iskanto, representing the Indonesian Muslim Community of Victoria

and Mr. Nuim Khaiyath, the former Head of Indonesian Language Broadcasting on Radio Australia along with local representatives of the Faith Communities Council of Victoria.

We thank everyone involved for blessing us with their presence. Next year, we'd like to expand the event perhaps by collaborating with a neighbouring congregation; with an interfaith dialogue around fasting or another suitable topic.

Pastoral notes and prayer by Anneke Oppewal

Just 24 hours after this piece was written Victoria went back into a seven-day circuit

breaker lockdown. Self-care and steadiness not 'all-systems go' as we re-emerge.

Returning to more regular face to face contact Mark 1:35, Luke 4:42 and in person worship, ministry agents and congregations have been adjusting to a new 'normal'. For most of us this has come with ups and downs. Joy at being able to gather and see each other face to face again, excitement about restarting programmes and offering support to people in need, and gratitude for the relative security of the


At the same time some of us find ourselves feeling disoriented and exhausted by the demands put on them at this time while trying to get our heads around new regulations and re-establishing the old routines.

Many congregations find their financial situations changed, some volunteers hesitant to re-engage and members in varying levels of Covid regulation compliance or complacency. Difficulties, conflicts, and emerging concerns that were shelved over the past year because of Covid restrictions now suddenly needing urgent attention.

At Presbytery level this means that everything is suddenly all systems go, where requests for information and assistance seem to be coming in from every direction at once.

In the middle of all of that many ministry agents and leaders and members of congregations are very sensibly taking the opportunity to take time off to visit family and friends interstate they may not have seen for a while or to have some time to recuperate. I've been thinking of stories in the Bible where community leaders, after a time of challenge and difficulty, went to recover. Organising some time to spend with God and recharge their energy banks for the next stretch of ministry and service.

The scriptures tell us that Jesus retreats and goes to pray and recharge his batteries too. And perhaps that is something to remember as we move into the rest of 2021. Not everything has to happen at once, it is alright to take some time to adjust. Let us give ourselves and each other a chance to find our feet again and reconnect to each other and to God going forward.

Measuring your environmental impact

Port Phillip East Presbytery's property committee is building a picture of how we're addressing climate change through local action in congregations and other settings.

We're partnering with Five Leaf Eco-Awards, an Australian ecumenical environmental change program specifically designed for churches and religious organisations.

Using a series of non-competitive awards the program assists, inspires and rewards faith communities for taking environmental action

and becoming more sustainable in response to God's call to care for creation.



The Five Leaf Eco-Awards encourage holistic action for the environment covering five areas: Buildings, Worship, Congregation, Outreach, and Community Leadership.

We sent an invite out to each congregation, inviting them to use the Five Leaf Eco-Awards survey.

We'll be collating results in late July, with a view to presenting an overview and awards at our Presbytery meeting in August.

Looking into the mirror

Australia's five yearly national census is almost upon us, which means that 2021 is also time for the five yearly National Church Life Survey (NCLS) conducted across Christian denominations around the country.

The PPE Standing Committee has agreed to request all congregations in the presbytery to undertake both the members and leaders surveys in October-November this year.

The NCLS has been running for 30 years and is respected internationally as providing valuable information for church leaders to understand their church members' attitudes towards congregational life, worship, faith development, community service, and matters of social concern.

Along with the leaders' survey, the data becomes a resource to aid discernment and planning. The aim is not to compare churches, but to assist churches to look at themselves in the mirror. This is an incredibly helpful set of tools.

Dr Craig Mitchell will be co-ordinating the presbytery's engagement with the NCLS. More information about the NCLS and how it works will be available in the coming months.
